

Must fill a need at the local level and offered by Royal Rangers certified instructors and/or other competent instructors. Must be a minimum of two hours in length. Events 4 hours or longer do not count as multiple continuous learning opportunities.
- May be offered as indoor, outdoor, online, internet-based, or classroom-based formats.
- May fill a need that is specific to leadership development skills needed to work with Royal Rangers or provide specialized certification needed to teach skill merits.
- May not have been previously used to satisfy an individual's training requirements.



Advancement System Update 2023

In October of 2020 a team was formed to explore potential changes to the Royal Rangers advancement system in hopes of addressing two problem areas:

- Our current advancement system seems complicated to new leaders
- Boys who do not attend consistently have difficulty advancing due to the challenges with earning skill merits (Although recent changes have provided flexibility in earning Bible and leadership merits, that same flexibility is not currently available when earning skill merits)

The following represents an updated advancement process that addresses these issues. This system will be implemented according to the timeline described at the end of this document.

UPDATE SUMMARY

- 1. Merits will no longer be a direct component of the advancement trail. Boys may still earn merits if they choose, but they are no longer required for advancement (except for the GMA as noted below). Earning merits will be optional and separate from earning the advancement steps.
- 2. Boys will earn each quarterly advancement step by completing any (8) weekly lessons (see #7 below). Each lesson includes a pre-defined Bible lesson and a skill or leadership lesson¹ Leaders may substitute alternative Bible or skill/leadership lessons if they choose (see #5 below).
- 3. Boys must memorize one Bible verse at each advancement step. These verses will be taken from a pre-selected list of verses (4 verses per year, 12 per age group)
- 4. ER Spirit Challenge patches will now represent quarterly advancement steps for Expedition Rangers, similar to DR and AR. For each step, boys must complete (8) ER weekly lessons and memorize (1) specified scripture verse (similar to DR & AR groups).

¹ A new curriculum delivery system is in development using the Moodle online platform that will provide these pre-built weekly lessons.

- 5. For leaders who choose to teach something other than the pre-defined weekly lesson:
 - a. Bible lessons can be taken from any RR Bible lesson set or any lesson approved by your Pastor (this is already our current standard)
 - b. Skill or leadership lessons can be taken from ANY RR skill or leadership merit, of any color (to accommodate combined groups in smaller outposts)
- 6. Although NOT required for advancement, skill, leadership, and Bible merits may be earned by completing the necessary requirements.
 - a. Bible merits may be earned by completing (8) weekly lessons and reading one full chapter of the Bible from the weekly lessons just completed.
 - b. Leadership merits will return to their original format where each merit will be earned by completing a specific set of (5) lessons associated with that merit.
 - c. Skill merits will remain as they are Tool Craft, Lashing, etc. and will be earned by completing a specific list of requirements.
- 7. Lesson credit is based on the lessons as taught by the outpost leader, not the lessons as defined in the skill merit activity guide (if any). For example, if a leader takes 7 weeks to teach the Tool Craft merit, boys receive credit for 7 skill lessons, regardless of the fact that the Tool Craft merit teaching materials may only include 5 lesson plans. For merits that do not contain lesson plans, outpost leaders may define the number and structure of the lessons they will teach (unchanged from current standard). When leadership or skill merits are taught in a weekend format, (1) lesson credit is given for every 30 minutes of instruction.
- 8. To earn an annual year-end award (medal) a boy must meet the following requirements:
 - a. Complete/participate in any (32) weekly lessons (4 quarters @ 8 lesson each)
 - b. Complete one service project (format & time to be determined by outpost leadership).
 - c. Other additional requirements as currently stated in the boy's handbooks (unchanged from current requirements)
- 9. To earn the highest award in an age group, boys must earn all three annual year-end awards (medals), and meet any additional requires as currently stated.
- 10. **OPTIONAL GMA TRACK**: Boys have option of pursuing a GMA track in addition to the standard advancement trail as described above. The GMA track represents a list of optional additional requirements that must be completed to earn the GMA.
 - a. Earn a specified number of buffalo awards (see below)
 - GMA (2) buffalo awards (excluding Copper /Ranger Kids)
 - GMA with Merit (3) buffalo awards
 - GMA with Honors (4) buffalo awards
 - b. Complete the following additional requirements (unchanged)
 - Read the entire Bible or listen to it as an audio book.
 - Be at least 12 years of age and not yet reached 18 years of age.
 - Be an active member of a Royal Rangers outpost for at least (3) years.
 - Complete the GMA Capstone Project.
- 11. **Buffalo Awards** represent the completion of standard advancement trail as well as specified merits in each age group in pursuit of the GMA.
 - a. Copper Buffalo
 - Earn the RK Gold Trail award
 - Earn (24) RK achievement awards
 - b. Bronze Buffalo
 - Earn the Gold Eagle award
 - Earn the First Aid Skills, Global Missions (blue), and Bible Knowledge (blue) merits
 - Earn (3) red or gold leadership merits

- Earn an additional (12) blue or green skill merits
- c. Silver Buffalo
 - Earn the Adventure Gold award
 - Earn the Healthy Body, Global Missions (green), and Bible Knowledge (green) merits
 - Earn (3) gold or sky blue leadership merits
 - Earn an additional (12) green or silver skill merits
- d. Gold Buffalo
 - Earn the E3 award
 - Earn the Citizenship, Bible Doctrines, and Budget & Finance merits
 - Earn (3) gold or sky blue leadership merits
 - Earn an additional (12) silver skill merits

IMPLEMENTATION TIMELINE

This new system has been built into the new Royal Rangers mobile app curriculum delivery platform and will be released at the time that platform is launched. The date of that launch is dependent on the progress of the Every Boy Initiative in enlisting a specified number of financial sponsors for the Royal Rangers program.

Outdoor Skills Camp

Several years ago, the change was made in Royal Rangers to no longer provide camping skills training as a central component of Royal Ranger leader training. NTC was replaced with NRMC where the focus is on fun activities rather than camping skills. JTC and AJTC were revised to remove camping skills and focus on leader development for boys. However, camping events continue to represent a central part of the Royal Rangers program and are practiced at National Camporama, district camps, and FCF events.

It is therefore necessary that a training event be provided for both leaders and older boys that will provide an adequate introduction to basic camping skills.

OBJECTIVES

- Provide outpost leaders with instruction on basic outdoor skills.
- Serve as the venue for camp skills training, replacing those classes at NRMC & junior training camps.

KEY ASPECTS OF OSC:

- Action Camp adult leaders and high school boys, 2.5 days in length minimum
- Conducted by the district
- Focus on basic outdoor skills

IMPLEMENTATION:

This material will be developed and implemented in conjunction with the release of NRMC in conference format, most likely in 2024.

World Class Outpost Update

Some time ago a team was formed to review and update the WCO materials. The objectives of this team was to accomplish the following:

- Review and revise the WCO materials to reflect current program standards, such as the revised terms for the Seven Methods, Rangers Lite & the Program Applications Matrix, and the Patrol System Matrix.
- Update or remove out-of-date content
- Reformat the instructor guide & student notebook to allow for the creation of tables of content, page numbers, and more consistent formatting.

Program elements that are still in transition have NOT been included at this time to avoid confusion. However, this will require an additional update at some future date once these elements are released. This includes:

- TracClub and the new Moodle-based RR App curriculum delivery system
- New "attendance-based" advancement system

UPDATES INCLUDED

- 1. Added the "Program Application Matrix" and "Rangers Lite" content to Session 5.
- 2. Updated the seven methods in session 5 to reflect current terminology.
- 3. Created a new Outpost Assessment scoresheet that reflects current program elements.
- 4. Removed the content in session 4 referring to "Habitual Leaders" vs. "Situational Leaders" as it does not align with our current leader training philosophy.
- 5. Reformatted the instructors guide and student workbook and made numerous minor edits and corrections.

NRMC Conference Format

Two of the most significant challenges we face with our current format for NRMC are as follows:

- Significant fees may be required to rent facilities suitable for NRMC, often as high as \$2,000 or more per camp.
- Reliance on the trainees pre-existing knowledge of camping skills, which many leaders may not reliably possess.

The following therefore represents a concept for conducting an NRMC event in a conference format rather than a camping format. This format could be used as early as 2024.

KEY FEATURES:

- 1. All the same manhood sessions, Saturday activities, and patrol features that are used in the original "camp" format will be retained in this "conference" format but no camping skills are taught or practiced.
- 2. This format assumes the trainees are learning camping skills through a separate leader training event (see "Basic Outdoor Skills Camp")
- 3. All meals are prepared by the staff and served together in the dining hall
 - a. This is the format we are currently using for Friday lunch, Saturday breakfast, and Sunday breakfast. We will now be serving all (6) means in the dining hall, not just (3).
- 4. Trainees may be housed on-site (in tents, dorms, etc.) or off-site, on their own. If housed off-site, trainees are responsible for making their own housing arrangements. They will leave camp each evening and return each morning.
 - a. This is the format we're currently using for WCO and JBEI.
 - b. Some locations may be able to offer a housing option on site, but that will be managed separately from the event.
- 5. Staff may be housed on site or off site, depending on the facilities available.
 - a. Staff housing will be covered as an expense of the camp whether on-site or off-site.
- 6. Camp registration fees may be reduced due to the elimination of housing and the need to rent campground facilities that include adequate housing for staff. However, some trainees may pay higher costs for housing if housed off-site.
- 7. This event could be conducted at any church or similar location where space is available for:
 - a. Large meeting room
 - b. Kitchen & food storage facilities
 - c. Outdoor space for the Saturday activities
 - d. Housing for staff (depends on location)
- 8. Evening activities have been moved earlier in the schedule to allow time for trainees to drive to their chosen housing locations at the end of the day. This time has been taken from time previous used for preparing meals in the campsites, so the time required for evening activities is affected.
- 9. Pre-camp arrive & setup time for staff is reduced.
 - a. No model campsite setup
 - b. No patrol equipment or campsite inspections
- 10. Significant time is now available in the schedule for additional content to be covered due to the elimination of camp setup & breakdown, and meal prep & cleanup times. This will enable us to provide a more complete training experience for outpost leaders.
 - a. See camp schedule for the classes that have bene added.

IMPLEMENTATION:

- Camps for 2023 will remain unchanged and use the current "camp" format
- Limited pilot events may utilize this format in 2023
- May be fully implemented for all events beginning in 2024

Note that this remains a tentative plan and some details may change as this concept is further developed and piloted in different settings. Additional details will be released as they become available.
